RULES AND REGULATIONS

1. The Mississippi Valley Fair reserves to its Board the final and absolute right to interpret these rules and regulations, arbitrarily settle and determine all matters, questions and differences in regard thereto, or otherwise arising out of, connected with, or incidental to the Fair.

ENTRIES

2. All entries must be filed with the Fair office as provided for in the various divisions.
3. All entries must be made on the printed forms, which are at the back of this book. Please send a self-addressed stamped (business size) envelope to receive your entry tags from the Fair office.
4. ENTRIES IN ALL DEPARTMENTS CLOSE JULY 15TH, or when available space in the individual department is filled.
5. In the event of conflict of general and special rules, the latter will govern.
6. Articles which are the result of mechanical or artistic skill must be entered by the artist, inventor, manufacturer or authorized agent.
7. Should any individual enter an animal or article in a name other than that of a bonafide owner or attempt to perpetuate a fraud by misrepresenting any fact, the entry thus made shall not be allowed to compete for or receive any premium.
8. Exhibits which have been erroneously entered may, at the discretion of the manager and superintendent of the department, be transferred to their proper class previous to the judging. If the classes to which they have been transferred have been judge, they shall not be rejudged.
9. All animals must be entered in the name of the owner and must have been owned by him not less than 30 days prior to the opening day of the Fair unless otherwise stated in the special rules governing the department in which exhibited. In case of question as to the age of an animal, the superintendent shall appoint an expert, whose decision shall be final.
10. Substitution of animals entered for reasons satisfactory to the management of the Fair will be permitted prior to the opening day of the Fair, providing conditions as to ownership are complied with. All requests for substitution of this kind and the reasons therefore, together with name, date of birth and registry number of the animal substituted shall be approved by the superintendent of the department and filed in writing with the manager.

PEDIGREES

11. No animal can be entered or exhibited as pure bred unless the same has been recorded in the recognized book of record for their breed, and exhibitors must produce certificates of registry at the request of the superintendent in charge any time during the Fair.

STALLS AND PENS

12. Stalls and pens will not be reserved unless application is accompanied by the required fee. All applications should be sent direct to the manager, either previous to or at the time entries are made. Assignments will be made by the department superintendent. Stalls or pens absolutely cannot be used for sleeping quarters or storage of feed, but may be used only for stabling animals. Exhibitors must keep the space in the rear of their stalls clear and clean; all litter must be thrown where indicated by the superintendent of the department.

PLACEMENT OF EXHIBITS

13. All Exhibits must be on the ground not later than the date and hour specified in the rules for the department, except otherwise provided in special rules. Times for arrival and departures for all livestock classes are recorded in the rules for the several departments.
14. Articles entered by be sent by express or parcel post direct to Mississippi Valley Fair, but in no case will such package be received or placed on exhibition unless all charges are prepaid. Address on package should be as follows: (Entry Blank must be enclosed)

with sender's name and address printed legibly thereon. Instruction for returning same should be placed inside the package when sent, with shipping costs enclosed, or if by express can be returned express collect.
15. The management will use diligence to ensure the safety of all exhibits after their arrival and placement, but in no case will they be responsible for any loss or damage that may occur.

RELEASE OF EXHIBITS

16. All concessions and commercial exhibits must remain until 10:00 P.M. the last day of the Fair. All competitive open class exhibits must be in place and remain until the prescribed times as recorded for the department entered. Gate keepers and police will restrain any person from passing out the gates before hour of releasement with items or livestock that have been on exhibition, without a written order from the secretary.
17. Exhibitors in departments where entry tags are used must present entry tag receipt for the return of their exhibit to the superintendent or the assistants of the department in which the articles were shown. Under no circumstances will the exhibitor be permitted access to display cases or space where exhibits are shown.

AWARDS

18. Where there is competition, prizes will be awarded as far as there are worthy entries. Where there are fewer entries in a class than number of premiums offered, judges may, at their discretion, award a prize or prizes of such grade as the animal or article deserves.
19. No animal will be awarded a prize unless promptly brought into the show ring when class is called. Animals entered and not brought into the ring at the proper time, unless excused by the superintendent, will be charged double the regular stall or pen fee.

PAYMENT OF PREMIUMS

20. Premiums in all departments will be paid as soon after the date of the Fair as practicable. CHECKS NOT CASHED BY DECEMBER 31, 2010 WILL NOT BE HONORED FOR PAYMENT.

PROTESTS

21. All protests must be made in writing and accompanied by a deposit of \$20 in the livestock department and \$10 in all other departments, which will be forfeited if protest is not sustained. Such protests must state plainly the cause of the complaint or appeal and must be filed with the manager within twelve hours after cause of protest. No complaint or appeal based upon the statement that the judge or judges are incompetent will be considered by the Board. Judges decision will be final.

JUDGES AND CLERKS

22. Judges are requested to read carefully the general and special rules under the head of the department in which they are to serve and shall not award prizes to an unworthy animal or article, as it is the intention of the Fair Board that no premium of this kind shall be awarded any animal or article that is not deserving. This rule must be strictly adhered to where there be competition or not.
23. Judges shall report to the superintendent any exhibitor who in any way, whether in person or by agent or employees, interferes with them during the judging, or show any disrespect to them, whereupon the superintendent shall, at his discretion, demand a proper apology from such exhibitor or exclude him from further competition, and the Board may withhold from such exhibitor any premiums that have been awarded him, and disqualify him for further exhibiting at the Fair.
24. The person acting as clerk to the judge shall make accurate records of the awards granted. In the horse, cattle and swine departments, it is necessary that the name, registry number and date of birth be given for each animal awarded a prize. In case a substitute animal is shown or in case this data was not given, and recorded in the judge's book at the time entries were made, it must be secured by the clerk before animal leaves the ring.
25. The judges and superintendent of the department must sign each judge's sheet immediately after the awards are made. The sheets for each division judged shall be turned in to the Fair Office soon after the judging as possible.

SUPERINTENDENTS

26. Superintendents shall have full charge of their departments, being responsible to the Secretary and the Fair Board.

PUBLIC SAFETY

27. The Fair Board has given due consideration to public safety and have arranged for adequate Police and Fire protection for the duration of the Fair. Cooperation by Fair patrons with these staffs will enhance the chances of a "No Accident" Fair. The Mississippi Valley Fair will use all care and caution possible to prevent accidents or damage of every kind, but said Fair assumes no liability or damages to property or person of anyone attending, exhibiting, or doing business at the Fair.

EXHIBITOR RESTRICTIONS

28. Exhibitors must function from space assigned. None are permitted to roam the grounds soliciting orders for goods of any kind, donations for any cause or distribution of literature.

SPECIAL NOTICE

29. **NO INTOXICATING LIQUOR, BEER OR CONTROLLED SUBSTANCES CAN BE BROUGHT TO FAIR GROUNDS. THIS FAIR ASSOC. MAKES A SINCERE EFFORT TO ABIDE BY IOWA LAW, ALSO HOLDS AN IOWA LIQUOR LICENSE. WE ASK THAT ALL PATRONS ABIDE BY THESE LAWS.**
30. All Exhibitors and Patrons: No overnight parking on grounds prior to fair and all vehicles must be moved daily after midnight during the fair.

NATIONAL CODE OF SHOW RING ETHICS

Exhibitors of animals at livestock shows shall at all times deport themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their conduct in this competitive environment shall always reflect the highest standards of honor and dignity to promote the advancement of agricultural education. This code applies to junior as well as open class exhibitors who compete in structured classes of competition. This code applies to all livestock offered in any event at a livestock show. In addition to the "IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics," fairs and livestock shows may have rules and regulations which they impose on the local, county, state, provincial and national levels.

All youth leaders working with junior exhibitors are under an affirmative responsibility to do more than avoid improper conduct or questionable acts. Their moral values must be so certain and positive that those younger and more pliable will be influenced by their fine example. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers and absolutely responsible persons who violate the code of ethics will forfeit premiums, awards and auction proceeds and shall be prohibited from future exhibition in accordance with the rules adopted by the respective fairs and livestock shows. Exhibitors who violate this code of ethics demean the integrity of all livestock exhibitors and should be prohibited from competition at all livestock shows in the United States and Canada.

The following is a list of guidelines for all exhibitors and all livestock in competitive events:

1. All exhibitors must present, upon request of fair and livestock show officials, proof of ownership, length of ownership and age of all animals entered. Misrepresentation of ownership, age, or any facts relating thereto is prohibited.
2. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, or absolutely responsible persons shall provide animal health certificates from licensed veterinarians upon request by fair or livestock show officials. (Local exception for rabbit & poultry).
3. Junior exhibitors are expected to care for and groom their animals while at fairs or livestock shows.
4. Animals shall be presented to show events where they will enter the food chain free of violative drug residues. The act of entering an animal in a livestock show is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer and/or absolutely responsible persons for show management to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood, or other substances from the animal to be used in testing. Animals not entered in an event which culminates with the animal entering the food chain shall not be administered drugs other than in accordance with applicable federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules. Livestock shall not be exhibited if the drugs administered in accordance with federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules affect the animal's performance or appearance at the event.

If the laboratory report on the analysis of saliva, urine, blood, or other sample taken from livestock indicates the presence of forbidden drugs or medication, this shall be prima facie evidence such substance has been administered to the animal either internally or externally. It is presumed that the sample of urine, saliva, blood, or other substance tested by the laboratory to which it is sent is the one taken from the animal in question, its integrity is preserved and all procedures of said

collection and preservation, transfer to the laboratory and analysis of the sample are correct and accurate and the report received from the laboratory pertains to the sample taken from the animal in question and correctly reflects the condition of the animal at the time the sample was taken, with the burden on the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to prove otherwise.

At any time after an animal arrives on the fair or livestock show premises, all treatments involving the use of drugs and/or medications for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal shall be administered by a licensed veterinarian.

5. Any surgical procedure or injection of any foreign substance or drug or the external application of any substance (irritant, counterirritant, or similar substance) which could affect the animal's performance or alter its natural contour, confirmation, or appearance, except external appearance only and except for surgical procedures performed by a duly licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal, is prohibited.
6. The use of showing and/or handling practices or devices such as striking animals to cause swelling, using electrical contrivance, or other similar practices are not acceptable and are prohibited.
7. Direct criticism or interference with the judge, fair or livestock show management, other exhibitors, breed representatives, or show officials before, during, or after the competitive event is prohibited. In the furtherance of their official duty, all judges, fair and livestock show management, or other show officials shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation and respect and no person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them
8. No owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person shall conspire with another person or persons to intentionally violate this code of ethics or knowingly contribute or cooperate with another person or persons either by affirmative action or inaction to violate this code of ethics. Violation of this rule shall subject such individual to disciplinary action.
9. The application of this code of ethics provides for absolute responsibility or an animal's condition by an owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or participant whether or not he or she was actually instrumental in or had actual knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of this code of ethics.

2. A \$.25 entry fee is required per exhibit.
3. All exhibits must be in place by 10:00 A.M., Saturday, August 7th, 2010. If exhibitor does not intend to stay at the Fair after bringing in exhibit a deposit equal to gate and parking charges must be made and for which a receipt will be given. If departure is made within one hour of arrival the deposit will be refunded.
4. Each person who becomes an exhibitor thereby agrees to conform to the rules, conditions, and classes as established in this and all other parts of these regulations.
5. All exhibits are, from the time they are placed in competition until the close of the Show, in charge of the Show officials. No exhibit may be removed by an exhibitor without permission of the Show Superintendent or his designated representative.
5. Any number of entries may be made by an exhibitor in any class in the section or sections in which he is entitled to exhibit, except class numbers which are limited to one (1) entry only.
7. The Show officials reserve the right to remove from exhibition any entry which has wilted or is not worthy. Likewise awards may be withheld at the discretion of the judges.

THE EXHIBITS

8. American Rose Society rules regarding the eligibility of varieties, types and color classifications will govern all entries. Roses must be identified according to A.R.S. guidelines.
9. All blooms must have been grown by the exhibitor out-of-doors in their own garden.
10. Specimen blooms of Hybrid Teas, Hybrid perpetuals and Grandifloras (where specified) must be exhibited without side buds. Side buds will disqualify bloom.. Evidence of recent or improper disbudding will result in penalty. However, Single Hybrid Teas must be exhibited as naturally grown flowers not disbudded. On all other types of roses, exhibitors may remove any unwanted materials from any specimen without disqualification but subject to penalization for impairment.
11. Entries must be recorded on entry blanks available at the Fair Office or at the Show site on arrival. Entry tags furnished by the Fair must be completely filled out both top and bottom parts including exhibitor number, either typewritten, gummed labels, stamped, or printed and attached to the container, folded double so that only section, class and variety be exposed.
